Crossed Musuck mountain of
6th ^(Oct.) lodged at Williamstown.
The 7th at 1 o'clock arrived
at Bennington put up with
Doc Hovey — —
8th at 12 o'clock set out
from Bennington ~~at 12 o'clock~~
designing for head Quarters
but at 4 P.M. met Genl Rayer
at S^t Horts 12 miles from Still
water who ~~was~~ gave me an

and that the Enemy were
retreating and that more force
was wanting to stop them
I therefore returned with him
to Defts mill, where I arrived
9th about 10 o'clock & found
Gen Ellows had recrossed the
River at Saratoga not having
a sufficient force to face the
Enemy when they took posses-
sion of Schyler house & the
Baracks, Genl Gates being
just in their Rears they ^{destroyed}
all behind them - that is
I was ordered to take post
at Mitten Hill, The Enemy
appearing to be in motion. I
keep on the watch all night.

11th two field Pieces arrived last night where ordered off this morning for Fort Edward a Heavy Cannonading between the two armies Gen^l Gates took a number Prisoners —

12 This morning threw up a Breast work & mounted a six pounder that arrived last evening and Exchanged some shot with the Enemy —

13 a firing between the two ^{State Conty} armies Tuesday 14 a flagg from Gen^l Burgoyne with some proposals for Treaty in consequence of which a cessation of arms —

Wednesday 15th Treaty still continuing & Hostilities still cease. —

Thursday 16th last evening articles

of Capitulation were agreed on by Delegates from the contending Commanders to be Ratified at 3 o'clock this morning but Mr Burgoyne has been quibbling & in consequence it is put off to 12 at which time Hostilities are to commence if the terms are not agreed on by Mr Burgoyne —

17th the articles of Capitulation having been completed last yesterday the British army Paraded and marched to the R.C. fort the place agreed where the Arms were delivered up and then crossed the creek when Morgan Esq took possession

of their camp - The Prisoners
marched on towards Stillwater
where they crossed the River

18 I set out for Stillwater
about 10th o'clock when I
arrived the British Troops
were crossing the River I
tanked till after sun set.

Then set out to look for
Lodgings which I found at
a miserable hut about
4 miles from Stillwater

19th set out about 8 o'clock
and arrived at New City about

I dined with Doct.

arrived at Albany about

sun set put up with Dr.

Porter by whom am entertained

with great civility -

20 dined with Gen^l Gates

in company Burgoyne &
his suite -

21 dined with Dr. Porter -

preparing to set out with
Burgoyne & -

22 Mr. Burgoyne desires to
to tarry untill y^e 24 Major
Gaines set out & is to wait
for me at Kinderhook

23 Mr. Burgoyne is very de-
sirous to tarry one day
longer to finish his dispo-
sition which is granted him
therefore y^e 25th is the day
agreed on to set out all
his baggage & sent on

24 Mr. Burgoyne is still
desirous of another day
which is again granted
him. he promises not
to ask to tarry longer
than y^e. 26. — — —

25 it looks very much like
foul weather which I
fear will be the case.

26th this being the day ap-
pointed to set out had my
horses tacked but it being
very late before we could
get away it was determined
it was determined to set
out early in the morning

27 set out from Albany at
seven o'clock reached

Thendara Hook about 11 o'clock
which is 20 Miles — it rained
hard all the way — —

28 set out from Thendara Hook
in the morning arrived at
Hobbs Town about 12 which
is 18 miles rained & exceedingly
hard the whole way but
the accommodations being
very bad I left the company
at 3 o'clock and rode to
Barrington 10 miles and
put up at Mr. Allens where
I had an exceedingly good bed
& in every other respect
well accommodated —

29 still continues to rain
about 12 o'clock the company

came up, had a very good
dinner and determined to
halt here until the
weather is fair.

30th the weather clears up
dined at Mr. Allens and
set out at 3 o'clock for
Dry Chadwick, 10 miles when
we arrived before dark the
Baggage having come on
before.

31 took breakfast at Chad-
wick & set out for Spruce
which is 10 miles this is in
the middle of the Green
wood set out from Spruce at
10 o'clock and arrived at

Glasco about 2 11 miles
here made a short halt
& at 3 set out for Westfield
10 miles where arrived about
6 got good Quarters at
Fowlers Tavern I lodged at
Col. Moulays

Nov: 1st set out from Westfield
at 4 o'clock reached the
River & arrived at Springfield
at Parsons's between 6 and
7: hear the German Troops
have got no farther than
Salmon which determines
us to halt here tomorrow
& some of the Baggage
came up in the evening

ie visited Mr. Hancock
a who is on her way to
meet her Husband at
Hedford — —

3rd Nov. The company set
out about 8 o'clock I wait
for Genl. Glovers Waggon
till 1 when took my
Baggage out of it and put
in Nichol's and set out
for Blip's in Palmer
where I arrived about
sun set —

4th set out from Blip's
early in the morning Break-
fasted at Brookfield — dined
at — arrived at Cape Carter
about 6 o'clock found the
company had gone 4 miles

further on —

~~4th set out from Carter's~~
5th set out from Carter's at
1/2 after 6 horse gave out
at Marlborough hired
a horse of the Tavern keep-
er and left mine with
Jon^d Temple to be sent
to Boston overtook the
company at West town &
dinner after dinner set
out for Water town where
arrived before night —
6th hard Rain left the
company at Water town
and went to Cambridge
about 1 o'clock he could

procure no lodgings for the
~~company~~ ~~tauced~~ at
Cambridge —

7th the company came
to Cambridge ~~and~~
~~for~~ about 10 o'clock I set
out for Boston and return
to Cambridge in the evening
8th attended Mr Burzoyne
